## How can I help at home? Working Memory

Working memory refers to how we hold on to, and work with, the information stored in our short term memory. Children use working memory to learn and follow instructions, with some being able to hold more things in their short term memory than others. It was thought that this was fixed and that most people could hold three or four thoughts at once but scientists now have a better understanding of the brain's plasticity, and there are ways to boost your working memory and in turn support your children's learning.

1. Work on visualisation skills. Encourage children to create a picture in their mind of what they've just read or heard. For example, say you've asked your child to set the table for five people. Have your child imagine what the table should look like, and then draw it. As kids get better at visualising, they can describe the image instead of drawing it.

2. Try games that use visual memory. There are lots of matching games that can help children work on visual memory, like the classic game, Pairs. You could play a game where there are a number of items on a tray, which is then covered with the aim of the game to remember what was on the tray. License plates can be useful for memory too - try taking turns reciting the letters and numbers on a license plate and then saying them backwards.

3. Play cards. Simple card games like Uno, Go Fish, and Top Trumps can improve working memory in two ways - children have to keep the rules of the game in mind and they also have to remember what cards they have and which ones other people have played.

4. Encourage active reading. Jotting down notes and underlining or highlighting text can help children keep the information in mind long enough to answer questions about it. Talking out loud and asking questions about the reading material can also help with working memory. Active reading strategies like these can help with forming long-term memories, too.

5. Chunk information into smaller bites. People often remember phone numbers by remembering a few small groups of numbers then putting them together. For example 01707-642-170. This is because it is easier to remember small groups rather than one long string of numbers. Keep this in mind when you need to give your child multi-step directions or when supporting them with a homework task.
